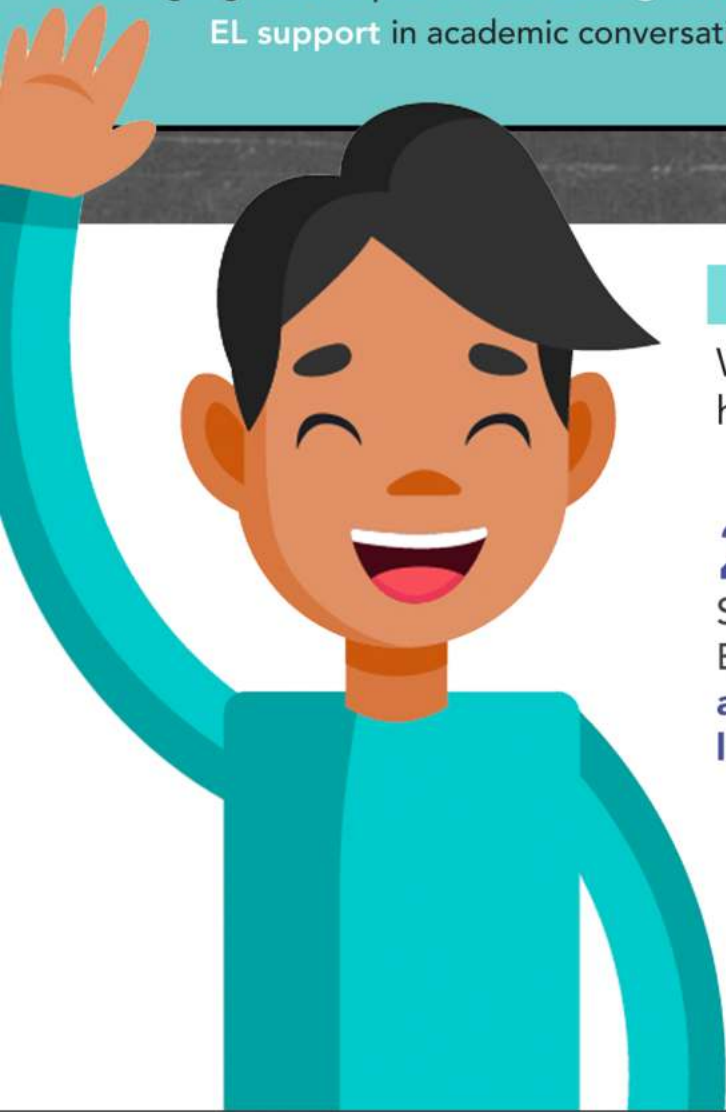


Supporting English Learners' Oral Language Development Through Academic Conversations

SupportEd's Tips

in Response to Educators' Questions

Encourage ELs' Participation



- **Pair** students intentionally. Group ELs with shared home languages together so students can **discuss in the home language before** transitioning to English.
- **Assign** specific group roles to ensure that every group role is **academic in nature** (e.g., avoid timekeeper).
- **Incorporate** additional practice for **listening to and sharing** ideas.

Create Activities for SLIFE



- **Practice** conversation with **familiar topics** first.
- **Introduce** scaffolded gap activities to **necessitate sharing** with one another.
- **Use** sentence stems and graphic organizers to provide **scaffolded support** for discussion.
- **Leverage** visuals that can represent key concepts and **facilitate discussion**.

Counter Colleagues' Concerns



- **Emphasize** that academic discussions don't have to **take a long time**.
- **Invite** colleagues into your classroom and demonstrate what **strong academic discussions** with ELs look like.
- **Share** video clips that model effective **academic conversations that include ELs**.



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
